## The group meetings program

## Lower motorway speeds?

Lowering motorway speed limits and introducing driving bans on Sunday are ideas being suggested to cut Britain's reliance on oil.

The ideas are part of a ten-point plan proposed by the International Energy Agency in a bid to reduce global oil demand by 2.7 million barrels per day.

Motorway speed limits would be reduced by 6mph across the country under the proposals, while the plan also suggests a ban on driving in cities every Sunday.

Also included in the plan is working from home three days a week, and using high-speed night trains instead of planes where possible

The IEA was set up by OECD after the 1973 oil shock to advise members.



Another fascinating session working with the IAAPS team to develop potential solutions to reduce vehicle pollution and combat climate change.

MaaS (Mobility as a Service) integrates various forms of transport-related services and has the potential to revolutionise mobility and provide a sustainable alternative to private cars.

The incubator brought together a broad range of participants from academia, public policy and industry to identify collaborative research opportunities in the following thematic areas.

- Infrastructure and Technology
- Systems Integration
- Data Connectivity, stakeholders, and user adoption
- Public-Private collaboration and innovation in the MaaS design and implementation

Attending the first day, on June 5th, gave a fascinating insight into the current thinking on the need for private car ownership and the options that may be available for the future led by Rita Filipe-Filipe and Andrew West. Rita is well known to TVGAM as she took part in the planning for last year's roadshows.

Predictions are that there will be a significant drop in private car ownership over the next few years but that is not to say the number of drivers will reduce. This creates a paradox as drivers will still need driving skills but are likely to drive less frequently. We all remember the skill fade that happened during lockdown and that driving standards in the main have not returned to pre-Covid levels.

The prospect of a fully integrated national transport network of all transport types where the use of the private car is significantly curtailed will bring new challenges to us all. It is an easier prospect for cities and larger towns to achieve these networks than rural areas and the cost vs need for private car ownership in places like London, Manchester and Birmingham may become prohibitive. The demand for on-demand transport will undoubtedly increase and this is beginning to happen in places like Milton Keynes, where an enterprising venture allows a driver to hire an EV which is delivered remotely to their home, they undertake their drive, and the vehicle is collected remotely when off-hired.

It is a real mindset change to envisage what research and development may emanate from Mobility as a Service in the future. The key thinking is maybe to consider the cost of owning and running a vehicle versus the time we actually spend driving it. Other factors include where we live and the ability, freedom, and convenience of being able to travel to where we want to go when we want rather than be dependent on public transport timetables and schedules.

From a Government perspective, road tax, fuel tax and VAT on vehicles is a very significant revenue stream, so what might replace these?

So many questions - let's hope that TVGAM's contribution to this Incubator engenders some inspiration for our partners students to help solve the mobility issues of the future.

## Hybrids are nothing new

For those motorists investing in a Hybrid vehicle, it may come as a surprise to know that they were around over 200 years ago.



The Lohner-Porsche Mixte Hybrid was first launched at the Paris Exhibition in 1900 by GB coachbuilder E.W.Hart.

The drivetrain had been developed with low-friction by mounting the electric motors to the hubs. These motors directly drove the wheels. Each motor had the capability of 2.5 to 3.5 horsepower and up to a maximum of 7 horsepower for short bursts. In the beginning, the "System Lohner-Porsche" prototypes were two-wheel drive. Lohner-Porsche had announced an electric powertrain and Hart ordered one, with specific modifications as he wanted the 'Electromobile' to also run on petrol, seat four people and include four-wheel drive. Ferdinand Porsche set to work even though he had no higher education in engineering.

Hart's Lohner-Porsche mixed hybrid required almost two tons of 80volt leadacid batteries that had to be encased in a spring-suspended container to protect the cells. These batteries powered 1,280 pounds of electric motors. The four motors were mounted on each of the hubs and created the power to move this nearly 4.4 tons of vehicle.

300 vehicles were sold between 1900 and 1906, but It was an all-round disappointment it failed in an endurance trial run by the Automobile Club of Great Britain due to tyre-shredding on the rough roads because of its weight.

#### **Advanced Driving & the Importance of Refresher Drives**



I recently did a talk with TVGAM about how to maintain advanced driving knowledge and skills and reflected on the issue of skill fade. This is a concept that has become increasingly popular post pandemic when many people gave up activities that they would have previously engaged in. The phrase 'use it or lose it' seems to capture the concept e very well. However, I also pointed out how we can experience skill fade even when we are engaging in activities on a regular basis. For instance when, someone passes the driving test and then loses many of the skills that were taught to them by their driving instructor. Although this can happen over a few years, skill fade can begin to creep in very quickly. I took a newly qualified driver out for a taster drive last year and was surprised at how quickly they had stopped employing techniques that would have got them through the driving test a few months earlier. The person in question was unaware that they had stopped using these techniques.

You will sometimes hear the statement that you learn to pass the driving test and then learn how to really drive. I have never been convinced by this statement because we are taught very good techniques by driving instructors and when it comes to advanced driving we build on this knowledge. What we mostly see when we conduct taster or refresher drives are that people have developed bad habits, which they are mostly unaware of until it is pointed out to them. A common theme is carrying too much speed into situations where it offers you no real advantage and moreover requires you to speed up your driver inputs and observations. Taster drives are free to people who want to 'try before they buy' an advanced driving course with IAM RoadSmart. Refresher drives are free to members of IAM RoadSmart local groups and can be booked via the relevant group website. We always encourage members to book a refresher drive because it will ensure that you have an up-to-date analysis on your advanced driving and what action you need to take to bring yourself up to test standard. We are looking into how we can offer refresher drives at weekend meet ups and we will share more information about this nearer the time. In the meantime, if you would like to have chat about a refresher drive, I would be more than happy to talk through this with you at an appropriate time and date.
